
We wish you the best in your travels and hope that each and every one of you can visit our home here at the base of the Sangre de Cristo Mountain range of Taos Pueblo.



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
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# Princesa Jasmine Dee Marie Peralta

At the pageant, she told the audience about her devotion to her religion. "I hold my faith in my heart," she said.



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# She's got the look

## How are the Royal Court dresses chosen?

The Taos Fiesta attire for the Royal Courts has always resembled the traditional and elegant apparel worn for celebrations throughout the history of Taos. The attire consists of a ribbon and/or laced peasant blouse and is paired off with a traditional hand-pleated cotton or velveteen broomstick skirt. In addition to their apparel, the Royal Court wears classic black pumps or black suede moccasins accented with sterling-silver conchas. Each of the young ladies adorns her attire with family heirlooms of traditional Southwestern sterling silver jewelry and belts with turquoise, coral, jade, onyx or opal stones to match. To complete their look, Las Princesas wear a time-honored hair comb brought from Spain called a peineta, draped in white Spanish lace called a mantilla. La Reina wears a sterling-silver crown with blue turquoise stones embedded in the center and engraved with the names of the patron saints of the Taos Fiestas, Santiago and Santa Ana, made by Meliton Trujillo in 1980.

## What kinds of things are considered when picking out the fabric colors?

Fabric colors are chosen to complement the Royal Court, to accent the shade of their skin, the blush of their cheeks and the color of their eyes. Furthermore, the dresses are worn during celebrations and are usually lively, bright and of rich colors, designed to stand out.

## Who supplies the dresses?

The Taos Fiesta Council supplies two handmade dresses made by a dear friend of mine and a great supporter of the Taos Fiestas, Linda Medina, a lifelong Taoseña currently residing in Río Rancho. The first attire provided to the court is worn for the Royal Pageant as their first unity outfit, in which all the young ladies wear the same dress. The second attire is the official Fiestas outfit with one full white dress for La Reina and matching dresses for Las Princesas. Any additional fiesta apparel has been purchased by the court from local boutiques or from Mrs. Medina.

## How long does the court get to keep the dresses?

The dresses worn by the court are made specifically for each member of the Royal Court and are theirs to keep.

## Where else do they wear them?

In addition to the Taos Fiesta weekend, the young ladies wear their traditional fiesta attire to the masses and parades of the Santa Fe Fiestas, Las Vegas Fiestas, Española Fiestas, the State Fair parade, the Taos Pueblo annual Powwow, Taos Rodeo, the Taos Chamber of Commerce, and many local, neighboring and religious events.

## Have you had a favorite among the dresses over the years?


I have helped design many fiesta dresses and I cannot favor one over another. They were all beautiful and I am honored every year to see the joy that it brings to each court.

## Storied past, hallowed traditions, Taos-brand jubilee

**T**he July air makes its presence known — an unseen character in Taos' summer drama. But another invisible player tends to take up more space than the heat this time of the year. For with July, a reverie rolls in. It's the anticipation and the excitement, the memories and the promises of Las Fiestas de Santiago y Santa Ana.

It's recorded that Las Fiestas celebrations in the area began as early as the 1600s, according to documents from the Taos Historical Society, when Spanish colonists arrived in the region. They set out to claim land granted to them by the king of Spain.

So eventually these settlers began to honor the days of two patron saints, St. James (Santiago, July 25) and St. Anne (Santa Ana, July 26). St. James stands as the patron of Spain and caballeros, or horsemen, while St. Anne protects children, girls and grandmothers.

The Historical Parade and Children's Parade of today developed from the processions started back in those early days of the settlers.

Fiestas have always been a time of commemorating the sacred past and its traditions while feasting with family and friends. And indeed, in a publication the Taos Historical Society printed in 1953, an anonymous visitor recounts his first

memories of Taos and its Fiestas:

"Darkness was coming on and flares were being lit in all the little booths and tents ...

Long hitching racks ringed the outer edge of the plaza proper, and ponies and wagons crowded one another solidly.

Little lost Indian colts, whinnying shrilly for their dams, poked

their noses into tents in frantic search.

The high blaring tunes of a carosel and the voices of barkers added to the strangeness and excitement of this little unspoiled mountain village.

Nothing was organized — Everything was casual and utterly, unexpectedly delightful.

The plaza was thronged with jostling, happy, excited people, with children and dogs underfoot. It was all very gay and spontaneous and foreign and warm — an elixir to the spirit after the deadly uniformity of Southern California with its dreary little towns of sameness. I even remember some of the artists brandishing balloons, and dressed in gay costumes — not 'creations,' mind you — but just fun ...

This, then my first ... enjoyment of fiesta in the village of Taos ...

Have the diversions, distractions and merry escapades changed much over the many decades since?

Come discover for yourself.





The parades remain a special highlight of Taos Fiestas. The committee in charge of the Historic Parade and Children's Parade receives help from the Kiwanis Club in registering floats, mapping out the route and coordinating the judges.

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# ¡Sabor!

**T**hese popular recipes come from the late food columnist of *The Taos News*, Fayne Lutz. Throughout her years contributing to the newspaper, she informed many readers on how to prepare delicious regional dishes.

## Jalapeño Potato Salad

- 4 medium russet potatoes, peeled and diced
- 1 can (10½ ounces) chicken or beef broth
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 ribs celery, diced
- 1 large white onion, diced
- 2 whole jalapeños, canned, seeded and diced (not pickled)
- 1 jar (2 ounces) diced pimento
- 4 hard-boiled eggs, peeled and sliced
- Salt to taste
- 2/3 cup mayonnaise (or Miracle Whip)

Cook potatoes in chicken broth and garlic until tender. Drain well and discard garlic. Place cooked potatoes in large bowl. Add diced celery, onion, jalapeños and hard-boiled egg slices. Salt to taste, then add mayonnaise. Mix lightly until potatoes are coated with mayonnaise. Chill. Makes 4-5 servings.

Potatoes are native to South America and were imported back to Mexico from Spain.

## New Mexico-Style Squash, Corn and Green Chile

(Calabacitas, Maíz y Chile Verde)

- 3-4 corn ears in the husk or 1 cup frozen whole-kernel corn, thawed
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 4 medium zucchini or other fresh summer squash, thinly sliced
- 2 whole green chiles, roasted, peeled and seeded, then sliced
- ½ cup grated cheddar cheese

Using a sharp knife, cut kernels from corn ears to make at least 1 cup.

Heat butter or margarine in a large skillet over medium heat. Add onions and garlic. Cook until softened, but not brown. Add squash. Cook and stir until squash is softened. Add corn and cook and stir another few minutes, stirring often. Add green chile. Salt to taste. Add cheese and heat until cheese begins to melt, then serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

*All of these ingredients are native plants. The dish is Native American in origin.*

## Tortilla Cinnamon Sugar Crisps

*These tortilla crisps are a delight. Use your own homemade tortillas or the whole-wheat kind. One package large flour tortillas will make about four dozen crisps.*

- 6 tablespoons sugar
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 2 tablespoons light corn syrup
- 6 7-inch flour tortillas


Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Combine sugar and cinnamon. Brush one side of each tortilla with light corn syrup, then sprinkle generously with sugar-cinnamon mix. Cut each tortilla into wedges. Place each on a baking sheet. Bake for 10 minutes or until golden and crisp.



## Chile Colorado con Carne

- 2 ½-3 pounds coarsely ground pork or shredded beef
- 3 or 4 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 or 5 cups water or beef stock
- ½ cup ground red chile (Hatch, Dixon, or Chimayo)
- 1 or 2 cloves garlic, minced

In a large skillet, gently cook meat; don't brown. When meat is cooked, add flour to accumulated fat in pan and cook and stir flour two or three minutes. Add garlic and salt. Stir, then add chile to meat-flour mix and cook and stir to coat meat with chile. Gradually add water or meat stock to chile-meat mix. Cook over medium heat until thickened and bubbly. Cook a minute or two, taste, add more salt if necessary. Thin as desired. Makes about two quarts. Serve with cooked pinto beans or as an enchilada sauce.



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
